Introduction

North Central Indiana Special Education Cooperative

Between the ages of 18-21 years, young adults with disabilities and their families must exchange the security of the school environment for a complex system of adult service programs. The federal, state, and local agencies that support adults with disabilities have very different sets of rules and requirements, and unlike schools, are not mandated to serve all citizens. It is important to remember while all students are entitled to a free appropriate education, access to adult services is based on eligibility and availability of funds.

This booklet serves as a guide to assist in identifying the various options that are available to students with disabilities after high school. It also serves as a tool to develop the students' Transition Individual Education Program.

Definitions

Age of Majority

When a student becomes eighteen (18) years of age, all rights that were formerly provided to the student's parents under the special education rule shall transfer to the student unless the student

BODS

Bureau of Developmental Disabilities Services. The bureau assists eligible individuals to receive the community and residential support needed for success in their community.

Guardianship

An individual or institution appointed by the court to handle the affairs of an incapacitated person.

IEP

Individualized Education Program. Developed each year in the Annual Case Review (ACR) with parents, teachers, and student This plan outlines the student's goals and objectives for one year.

Transition TEP

This plan is the IEP for students beginning at age of 14. This plan is developed annually and tracks students' post-secondary plans.

Medicaid

Provides coverage for persons of limited income and resources that require ongoing medical needs.

Medicaid Waiver

Waivers are vehicles states can use to test new or existing ways to deliver and pay for health care services in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP).

VR

Vocational Rehabilitation. Works with eligible individuals whose disabilities substantially interfere with their ability to obtain and/or maintain work.

Timelines

Age 14

- Attend IEP meeting. Transition planning begins!
- · Inquirer about graduation requirements.
- Decide if student is diploma or certificate track.
- Start career exploration.
- · Apply for Medicaid waiver if not done so already.
- Apply for SSI/SSDI and Medicaid.
- Obtain Indian State ID card at local Bureau of Motor Vehicle.

Age 15

- · Attend IEP meeting.
- Choose high school schedule.
- Explore careers, colleges, and vocational training programs.
- Explore diploma types
- Maintain and medical and school psychological testing.
- Apply for Medicaid waiver if not done so already.

Age 16

- · Attend IEP meeting
- Find and hold part-time paid or volunteer job in the community.
- · Investigate guardianship or power of attorney.
- Obtain driver's license if appropriate.
- Monitor high school credits and graduation requirements.
- · Apply for accommodations for college entrance exams.
- Apply for Medicaid waiver if not done so already.
- Investigate financial trustoptions.

Age 17/Junior Year

- · Attend IEP meeting.
- Enroll in vocational classes.
- Establish graduation date.
- Discuss age of majority and transfer of rights to student at age 18.
- · Investigate guardianship or power of attorney.
- Meet with Vocational Rehabilitation representative.
- Investigate post-secondary living arrangements.
- · Visit colleges and make contact with Office of Student Dis abilities.
- · Take college entrance exams.
- Maintain and medical and school psychological testing.
- · Apply for Medicaid waiver if not done so already.
- · Investigate financial trust options.

Age 18/Senior Year

- Attend IEP meeting.
- · Apply to colleges and scholarships.
- Register to vote. Males register for Selective Service.
- · Transfer of rights to students.
- Establish guardianship or power of attorney.
- Review health insurance coverage.
- · Apply for SSI/SSDI and Medicaid
- · Maintain and medical and school psychological testing.
- · Investigate financial trust options.
- · Meet with Vocational Rehabilitation.

Age 19-22

- Monitor vocational education
- Make contact with post-secondary personnel
- Continue close contact with Adult Service Providers
- Ensure all necessary support services are ready to be provided immediately after graduation.
- Investigate financial trusts options.
- Maintain and medical and school psychological testing.
- · Apply for SSI/SSDI and Medicaid.
- Obtain Indian State ID card at local Bureau of Motor Vehicle.
- Make contact with Vocational Rehabilitation.

Prior to graduation/secondary education

- · Obtain any special testing records.
- Make contact with Vocational Rehabilitation.
- Consult with high school guidance counselor and teacher of record to get a thorough understanding how much support is necessary for success.
- Investigate post-secondary living arrangements.
- Contact BODS.
